The past few months have been enormously eventful for our Lodge. September brought a fabulous picnic. There was good food, camaraderie and fun had by all. Many of us could not eat the next day.

The property is on Little Neck Parkway right near Temple Torah. Once, the property was a nursery when this part of Queens was mostly rural farmland. Some parts of the property hark back to a time a century ago. But do not worry; our new Castle Hall will have the amenities of the 21st century.

Yet, when I first saw the property, I started to think about what America was like in, let's say, 1915. In that year, there were thousands of lodges throughout this nation serving many different religious, ethnic and cultural groups. It was a time when many immigrants worked hard for meager wages. It was a time in which television, computers, and smart phones were not even in the dreams of science fiction writers. Though the radio existed, its commercial heyday was yet at least more than a decade away. For entertainment, the wealthy did have the newly invented phonograph, but many knew how to play instruments and made their own music. Others spent hours reading, but most people at that time would gather together in some fashion for company and friendship. Fraternal lodges often served that purpose. In addition, it was a time when the government furnished few services and lodges had the added function of providing charity and benevolence. Lodge brothers would support one another during times of trouble or crisis. Members would be there to provide a helping hand. If someone needed help, the lodge would be there to provide moral as well as some financial support and help. At that time, many lodges often dedicated themselves to helping children. A century ago many children—especially immigrant children—often were destitute and had to work at a young age to support their families. The concept of teenage culture did not

exist. Many boys at the age of 12 or 13 years had what we call adult responsibilities. Lodges often helped such kids. During that era the idea of providing such children some relief by giving them a few weeks in the country at a camp or some form of recreation came to the fore.

A hundred years have brought a lot of progress and yet we still have many children who still need help. In the year 2015, there are still millions of American children who have never experienced the joy of camp, the fun of playing on a team, and the lessons of scouting. Many are not only physically hungry, but also hunger for an education. There are still many children who have debilitating illnesses or suffer from disabilities. That is why lodges are still important. We still are needed to raise money to help all who are in need—especially children. In a world that is more self-centered and in which many often think more about things than people, lodges are still needed to practice simple acts of altruism. I urge everyone to dedicate himself in the coming year to doing some good work and to encouraging others to join us in helping our fellow man.

HAPPY NEW (TAX) YEAR!

First and foremost, I want to wish all my readers a happy and peaceful New Year. Your emails and calls are appreciated. It's that time of year again. The income tax filing season has begun and important documents should be arriving in the mail. Even though your return is not due until April, getting an early start will make filing easier.

Here are the Internal Revenue Service's top tips that will help your tax filing process go smoother than ever this year.

1. **Start gathering your records.** Round up any documents or forms you'll need when filing your taxes: receipts, canceled checks and other documents that support income or deductions you're claiming on your return.
2. **Check your mail.** W-2s (make sure you receive one for every job) and 1099s will be coming soon (by Feb. 15); you'll need these to file your tax return.
3. **E-file.** After 23 years, the IRS e-file has become the safe, easy and the most common way to file a tax return. Last year, nearly 122 million people used IRS e-file.
4. **Filing options.** There are many different options for filing your tax return. You can prepare it yourself or go to a tax preparer. Give yourself time to weigh all the different options and find the one that best suits your needs.
5. **Consider Direct Deposit.** If you elect to have your refund directly deposited into your bank account, you'll receive it faster than waiting for a paper check. Best of all, combine e-file with direct deposit and get your refund in as few as 10 days.
6. **Visit the IRS website.** The official IRS website (www.irs.gov) is a great place to find everything you'll need to file your tax return: forms, publications, tips, answers to frequently asked questions and updates on tax law changes.
7. **Check and re-check.** Don't rush. We all make mistakes when we rush. Mistakes will slow down the processing of your return. Be sure to double-check all the Social Security numbers and math calculations on your return as these are the most common errors made by taxpayers.


